

Girl Scouts learn environmental lesson

ROCKLAND — Recently two Rockland Girl Scout Troops, No. 598 and No. 1834, completed their Eco-Action badges as part of the World Thinking Day activities held annually in February.

The Eco-Action badge asks girls to learn about the environment; how to protect and sustain the quality of life for all. They investigated how people can help other people, animals, and plants to stay healthy. They also

learned how to keep the air, soil, and water stay clean by conservation and recycling.

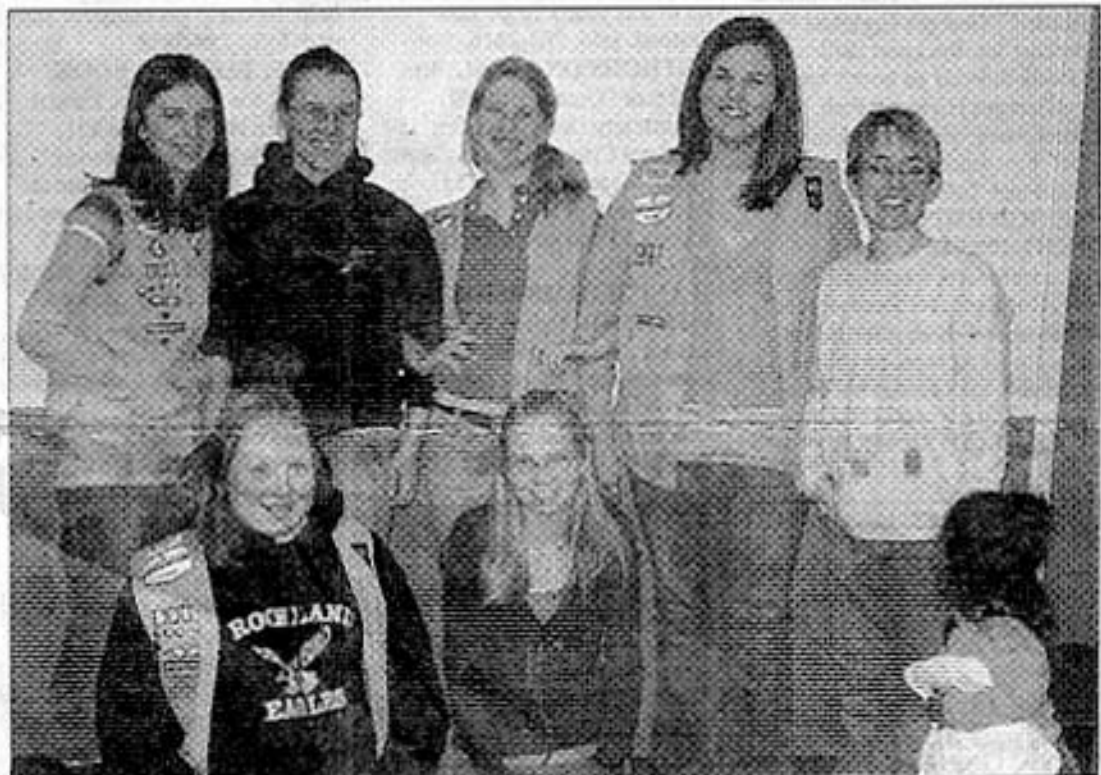
